THREE WAYS TO... SPOT A RARE CREATURE

Kenya

There are fewer than 550 black rhinos left in Kenya. But a new camp, Saruni Rhino, gets you within metres of these majestic beasts on a unique walking safari in the Sera Conservancy, where 11 protected rhinos have been re-homed (saruni.com; doubles from £635pp, full board, including conservation fee and safari).

Borneo

Borneo has a bevy of rare wildlife, and its posh Shangri-La Rasa Ria hotel has just launched a range of species-specific trails. Take a night-time trek with infra-red goggles to see nocturnal sambar deer (free), or hang with orangutans (£250) in what could be the last two decades of their existence (shangri-la.com; doubles from £272, B&B).

Madagascar

Get lemur fever in the island's rainforested, northeastern reaches — the best place to see the aye-aye lemur. Play 'aye-aye spy' with trips from glam Masoala Lodge, which launches exclusive flights to the northeast from the capital in April. Stay there on a new 15-day tour (reefandrainforest.co.uk; from £4,654pp, with flights).
